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MEETING ORGANISATION

Rules

The Meeting will be shot under ISSF Rules, modified, as shown in the competition programme, to comply with NSRA and/or IPC Rules and Regulations.

Competitors will be deemed to know the Rules, copies of which are available for purchase from the NSRA Showroom.

Control

The Pistol, Airgun and Crossbow Committee is responsible for the organisation of the Meeting. All shooting will be under the control of the Chief Range Officer and the assistant range officers.

All matters relating to conditions of entry and the application of shooting rules will be dealt with by the relevant Jury.

The names of the Committee and Juries will be displayed on the notice board for the duration of the Meeting. Decisions taken by these bodies will be final and binding for the period of the Meeting.

Any order exhibited on the notice board by the authority of the Committee and/or a Jury shall have the same force and effect as the NSRA Regulations. Any printed rule which conflicts with the conditions determined by these notes is automatically suspended for the duration of the Meeting.

Conditions of Entry

Entry to all the competitions in this programme is conditional upon the competitor being a Life, Annual or Associate member of the NSRA or paying the Meeting Membership fee.

Entry Fees

Entry fees must be paid in full prior to shooting. In the event of a competitor not

being able to attend the meeting. A refund will only be given if a medical certificate (or other relevant paperwork) is produced, a refund of entry fees less registration may then be given

Team Registration

Club and County Team registrations should be made on the entry form. Based upon the individual entry forms received, we will endeavour to alert clubs and counties of the possibility of a team entry prior to the commencement of the Meeting. Team entries may only be made at the Meeting under exceptional circumstances.

Protests and Appeals

Protests and appeals will be conducted in accordance with ISSF Rules, except that scoring protests must be made within 10 minutes of the time of posting of the score, which will be indicated on the score sheet.

Written protests and all appeals must be made on the appropriate form and be lodged with the relevant fee at the Meeting Reception Desk. The protest fee is £2.00. The appeal fee is £4.00.

The decision of the Jury of Appeal is final.

If the Jury or Jury of Appeal considers that a matter before it is one where it may be appropriate for a penalty to be imposed which extends beyond the end of the Meeting, that matter will be referred for decision by the NSRA Referees Committee.

On arrival at the Meeting

Please report to reception where you will be issued with your competition stickers, squadding notice and Competitor's Number Badge. This current badge **AND NO OTHER** must be worn at all times when shooting where it can be read easily by a range officer.

All competitors must then report to Equipment Control for inspection of their shooting clothing (as appropriate). Under NSRA rules all Rifles and Pistols must be checked. Under ISSF Equipment rules it is no longer mandatory to have your equipment checked if you already have the correct Equipment Control tags in place. However, if you do not have the relevant tags, or have new equipment, you should attend Equipment Control prior to the start of shooting. Competitors should be aware that random checks will take place during the Championships and if a competitor then fails Equipment Control they will be disqualified.

Equipment control will be open from early afternoon on Friday and 07.15 on both Saturday and Sunday. Competitors should note that it is their responsibility to assign enough time to be checked especially as the mornings before the first detail can be very busy.

Range Staff

Competitors are reminded that range staff are volunteers and receive no remuneration for their work during the Championships.

CONDUCT OF SHOOTING

Classification

An unclassified competitor is one who did not enter, or entered but did not fire all the targets in an Aggregate, at the British Championship Meeting in the two preceding years.

Unclassified competitors must substantiate their class by submitting the average ex 600 of the best 5 of their last 6, 60 shoot series (confirmed scores) on ISSF/NSRA 10m targets fired up to the time of entry.

The average will determine classification as shown:

As D Class Competitors will now be shooting on electronic targets rather than paper ones, a Minimum Qualifying Score (MQS) has been introduced. Any D class entrants whose scores at the meeting are significantly below the MQS may be stopped from shooting.

Competitors may elect to shoot in a class higher than their National Classification and will thereafter be deemed to hold that higher classification.

The onus for entering the correct class rests upon the competitor having submitted an accurate current average. The NSRA reserves the right to re-classify any competitor at any time.

The averages must be certified correct by the secretary or captain of the club. The penalty for submitting an untrue average may be disqualification of the competitor for the remainder of the calendar year from all NSRA shooting events and such other penalties as may be determined against the competitor and other signatory by the NSRA.

Promotions & Demotions

Promotions and demotions will be based on performance in the Championship Aggregate.

All competitors in Classes A, B, C and D who finish in the top 10% will be promoted to a higher class, the particular class to be at the discretion of the Competitions Manager.

All competitors in Classes X, A, B and C who finish in the bottom 10% will be demoted one class.

Timing of Promotion/Demotion

Competitors who earn promotion or demotion will be re-classified immediately.

Stickers

One sticker will be issued for each competition entered.. At the end of each shoot competitors in Classes X to D must sign the bottom of their printer strip before leaving the range.

Concurrent Shooting

All competitions will be shot concurrently with either the Championship or the aggregate courses of fire, please check either the entry form or this booklet to ascertain which competitions are shot concurrently with which courses of fire.

Firing Point

The firing point positions will be clearly numbered and competitors will fire from within their allotted space (NSRA Rule 6.9.5).

Spectators and competitors who are not shooting are not permitted forward of the printer boxes when a detail is in progress, it should also be noted that no person is allowed to interfere with any printer boxes and should not congregate around the printer boxes, a Range officer will ask you to move away if this happens

Targets

Sius Ascor electronic scoring targets will be used, except for competitors in the Sporter events (Competitions 17 & 18) who will shoot on paper targets.

Timings

Competitors may not uncase, or place their guns and equipment on their firing points until the Chief Range Officer has called "Athletes to the line". The Chief Range Officer will call "Athletes to the Line" 15

minutes before the Preparation and Sighting time starts. Competitors may carry out aiming and dry firing exercises. A 30 second warning will be given before the end of the time.

Match firing timings will be to ISSF rules 2013 (second print 01/2014)

Squadding

All competitions will be fired at the times stated in the programme and according to your personal Squadding Notice.

No change in squadding is permitted for Competition 3/23. No one may shoot in a squadded event other than in accordance with the squadding notice.

Some squads on Saturday and Sunday are reserved for those competitors shooting in the British Championships.

Cross Shooting

ISSF rules will apply.

Scoring

In accordance with ISSF Rules.

Tie Breaking

ISSF Rules will apply except for Competitions 8 and 28 when the higher score in Competition 7 or 27 will take precedence. If still a tie, ISSF Rules will be used on Competition 7 or 27 score.

Security

Competitors are reminded that it is their responsibility to safeguard their rifles/pistols at all times in accordance with current legislation.

Insurance

The Meeting is adequately covered for normal risks but the NSRA does not accept responsibility for articles which are lost or stolen from the range or its surroundings.

RANGE SAFETY

General Safety

Rule 7.2.2/8.2.2 of the ISSF Rifle/Pistol Rules states that:

"The safety of shooters, range personnel and spectators requires continued and careful attention to the handling of rifles/pistols and caution in moving about the range. Self-discipline is necessary on the part of all. Where such self-discipline is lacking, it is the duty of range officials to enforce discipline and the duty of shooters and team officials to assist in such enforcement."

To demonstrate that airguns are unloaded, safety flags (safety lines) must be used which are long enough to extend through the full length of the barrel. These must be inserted at all times when airguns are uncased, but not in use. Safety lines will be available for sale from reception, if you do not have one. If the nature of your particular airgun makes it impossible to use one of these, please speak to the Range Officer on your bay to make an alternative safe arrangement.

Dangerous or Unsafe Conduct

NSRA Rule 6.1.8 states that:

"A shooter may be suspended from shooting and ordered from the firing point by a Range Officer for dangerous conduct or for contravening any order, rule or condition of the competitions, and the

matter shall be reported by the Range Officer and dealt with by the Meeting Referees." For the purposes of this Meeting the role of the Meeting Referees is undertaken by the Jury and Jury of Appeal as appropriate.

Loading of Firearms

Airguns may only be loaded at the firing point and only after the signal to commence fire has been given. The action, breech or loading device must not be closed until the airgun is pointing down range in a safe direction toward the target area. No loaded airgun may be taken from the firing point nor fired in any direction except at the targets. An airgun shall be deemed to be loaded when a pellet is in the breech whether or not it is cocked and/or if a removeable magazine is fitted to the gun, whether or not it contains a pellet.

Competitors leaving the firing point before the end of a detail must ensure that their airgun is left in a safe condition.

Entry to the Firing Point

No one may enter or leave the firing point without permission from a Range Officer. If you do leave the firing point a safety line must be inserted.

Coaching on the firing point is prohibited - ISSF Rules apply.

Range Commands and Signals

Verbal in accordance with ISSF Rules.

ABUSE OF DRUGS

Definition

Drug abuse is the use by or distribution to a competitor of substances defined as being in contravention of existing rules.

The identification of a forbidden substance and/or one of its metabolites, or the presence of specified amounts of

endogenous substances subject to quantitative analysis, in a body fluid will constitute an offence and the offender may be penalised.

Any person assisting or inciting others in the contravention of these regulations shall be considered as having committed an offence against these rules and may be subject to disciplinary action.

Drug Testing

Any competitor must, if requested by an official designated by the NSRA for the purpose of drug control, submit to a drug control test. Failure to do so will be taken as if a positive result had been obtained and dealt with accordingly.

Exceptions

Except where other Federation or Union rules disallow it, competitors who have valid medical reasons for taking drugs which are proscribed will, subject to certain provisions being met, be permitted to enter for or be eligible for selection for individual and team competitions respectively at National and International level. No restriction will be placed upon their ability to win a prize. A competitor falling within this category may be requested to provide to the NSRA, prior to an event in which drug testing takes place, a certificate to that effect signed by their doctor.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, the NSRA will reserve the right, with the competitor's permission, to request its Medical Adviser to verify the details of the case with the doctor.

WARNING It could be highly dangerous for a competitor to give up or reduce a drug regularly taken. No competitor should take this course of action without medical advice.

Competitors taking any prescribed drugs MUST declare them before shooting.

CONDUCT OF SHOOTERS

Please note abusive behaviour of any nature will not be tolerated and may result in disqualification from this meeting; it may also be reported to the referees committee for further action.

ADMINISTRATION

Litter

Receptacles will be provided for litter. Your co-operation in keeping the range and its environs free of litter will be appreciated.

Photography

The taking of photographs within the Lord Roberts Centre is prohibited unless permission has been obtained. Permission can be obtained from the centre reception.

Flash photography is forbidden in the shooting halls when shooting is in progress. Any contravention of this regulation may result in disciplinary action being taken against the offender in accordance with the provisions of NSRA Rules 1.7 and 6.1.8.

Dogs

Dogs are not permitted in Lord Roberts Centre, except for guide dogs.

Mobile Telephones and Music-Producing Devices

The use of mobile telephones on any range is not allowed and in these areas they must be switched off.

The use of music-producing devices such as Ipods, MP3 players etc. is not allowed on the firing point.

Smoking

Smoking within Lord Roberts Centre and in its grounds is prohibited.

PRIZES

The NSRA reserves the right to increase or decrease or to amend any Prize List as published.

Prizegiving

Unfortunately, due to the revision of the timetable in 2015, there is no longer a complete prizegiving at the end of the weekend. This is to enable the incorporation of all the various championships, finals and aggregates into the time available. For those championships with finals, any trophies and/or prizes will be presented as soon as practical after the conclusion of each final.

All medals, vouchers and prizes which are not awarded during the meeting will be posted, together with the prize lists.

Winners of trophies not presented at a prizegiving will be notified by post, and can then arrange for collection if they so wish. Please note that any forwarding costs will be charged. NSRA Challenge Trophies may not be taken outside the United Kingdom.

Where medals are described as GOLD, SILVER and BRONZE, this is a description of the COLOUR and NOT CONTENT.

HOME COUNTRIES INTERNATIONAL MATCHES

Open to teams of three representing England, Scotland, Northern Ireland, Wales, Jersey, Guernsey and Isle of Man.

Intent of entry by the Smallbore Shooting Union or equivalent organisation must be made in writing to the NSRA not later than 10 days before the Meeting commences.

Members of the team and team officials must be qualified in accordance with NSRA Rule 3.2.

Team selection and method of selection is the responsibility of the respective Smallbore Shooting Union or equivalent.

A captain and secretary, either or both of whom may shoot, may be appointed in addition.

The names of the team and reserves must be notified to the Meeting Reception on the correct entry forms by 08.30 Saturday for Rifle and 08.30 Sunday for Pistol.

Members of winning teams will receive an NSRA gold medal. Embroidered emblematic blazer badges may be purchased from Headquarters.

These matches will be fired concurrently with the British Confined Championships on Saturday/ Sunday.

HOME COUNTRIES MEN'S INTERNATIONAL MATCH

Team of 3, 60 shots per team member. Shot concurrently with the relevant Championship.

HOME COUNTRIES WOMEN'S INTERNATIONAL MATCH

Team of 3, 60 shots per team member. Shot concurrently with the relevant Championship.

HOME COUNTRIES JUNIOR MEN'S INTERNATIONAL MATCH

Team of 3 juniors (men born on or after 1/1/98) - 60 shots per team member. Shot concurrently with the relevant Championship.

HOME COUNTRIES JUNIOR WOMEN'S INTERNATIONAL MATCH

Team of 3 juniors (women born on or after 1/1/98) - 60 shots per team member. Shot concurrently with the relevant Championship.

COUNTY & CLUB COMPETITIONS

4 / 24 COUNTY TEAM

Team of 3, 60 shots per team member. Entry restricted to one team. Both competitions 4/24 are shot concurrently with competition 6/26

A shooter may represent a County in both air rifle and air pistol.

Prizes - List C

The Inter County Airgun Challenge Cup and 8 NSRA Gold Medals to the County with the highest combined aggregate in Competitions 4 and 24. This Competition will only run if there are more than 3 entries.

Finals will take place as soon as possible after the results have been confirmed and final details will be posted on the results boards.

The leading 40% of competitors, subject to a minimum of four and a maximum of eight, in each Championship will go forward to the ISSF 2013 style final. These finals will run to the timetable, but competitors should check the results boards for the times, these times may be subjected to change.

If there are less than four competitors in a Championship event then a final will not be held.

PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

NATIONAL MEETING PARTICIPATION

The NSRA Shooting Council has approved a policy to follow the Shooting Rules and Functional Classification of the International Paralympic Committee (IPC) for participation by the disabled in NSRA competitions.

The application of this policy is dealt with in NSRA Rule 4 and the levels of competition open to disabled shooters are specified in NSRA Rule 4.6. The following notes outline the application of Rule 4 to the competitions at this Meeting which are not open exclusively to disabled shooters.

SH1A competitors are able to comply fully with ISSF or relevant rules. They are eligible to shoot in all competitions at this Meeting.

Other SH1 competitors are eligible to enter competitions in levels 3 to 8 inclusive. They are eligible to shoot in all competitions at this Meeting with the sole exception of the British Open Championships.

SH2 competitors are eligible to enter competitions in levels 7 and 8. They are eligible to shoot in all competitions at this Meeting with the exception of the British Open and Confined Championships and the Home Country Internationals.

SH1 categories are open to air rifle and air pistol shooters.

SH2 categories are open to air rifle shooters only.

All disabled shooters are subject to all restrictions applicable under the general entry conditions of a competition (e.g. age,

sex) and to any selection criteria applied by team selectors, such as the Home Country Unions.

Disabled shooters who have not been assessed against IPC categories, but hold another form of disability assessment, such as a DSE profile or an NSRA disability certificate, may take part. An assessment will be made as to whether they will be treated as SH1A, SH1 or SH2 during this Meeting.
